July 21, 2021 marked the 61st anniversary of the opening of the Forest Falls post office. Built in 1960 this quaint building is a landmark here in Forest Falls, but just like everything else, it experiences changes. Most recently, John Katena, the previous postmaster, retired in January. He served this community for 9 years and was loved by many. We were sad to see him go but are also thrilled for him to have the chance to enjoy his retirement. It also is a good opportunity for an introduction to your current postal team. Our crew consists of Postmaster Ken, Rob (your postal carrier) and myself. My name is Katie and I serve as your postal clerk. After more than a decade of service in the US Navy Ken has spent the last 21 years working for USPS. Prior to his appointment in Forest Falls as postmaster, he worked as a carrier and then supervisor in Cedar Glen. He is a wonderfully kind person with a great sense of humor. I am thrilled that he is apart of our team here in Forest Falls. Over the last 11 years, Rob has probably become familiar to many of you. He is the friendly face in the white van that can be seen delivering mail in this community and in Angelus Oaks He is a book

lover and enjoys swapping books in and out of our mini library. He is a great guy, a hard worker and a pleasure to be around! I have been working in Forest Falls for two years now. Originally from Long Island, New York, I transferred to this office in September of 2019. Although my husband, who is a postal carrier in San Bernardino, and I both love traveling and being outdoors, it was a drastic change for me to move so far away from my family, especially during the COVID pandemic. The warm reception from everyone in town has helped all us, including Atticus and Eloise (our feline fur babies), feel welcome. The beauty of Forest Falls is truly breathtaking. So many of you have been unbelievably kind to me: offering me a place to stay in case of emergency, making us baked goods, remembering our birthdays, and just overall taking the time to see how we are. 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


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## President's Message

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
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#### **Fallsvale School**

#### **Frequently Asked Questions:**

What are your hours? Our operating hours are Monday-Friday 9:30am-4:30pm. We are closed for lunch from 12:30pm to 1:30pm during the work week. The lobby is open 24/7. On Saturday our business window is not open but we are here in the morning hours to deliver mail and hand out packages if needed.

What time is my mail delivered? The PO Box delivery time is 2:30pm. If you have been living in town for a while you might have noticed that it is usually earlier than that but on days where the mail is very heavy or we are understaffed - it is guaranteed by 2:30pm. Mail on the street varies on delivery time, because Rob also delivers to the community in Angelus Oaks. Normal delivery time is between 11am and 3pm.

When does outgoing mail go down the hill? Our collection box out front is picked up at 2pm Monday through Friday. On Saturday the mail is collected at 10:30am.

How can I prevent theft from my mailbox on the street? We are all aware of the continual mail theft in town. It truly is a shame that this happens in such a small community. The best advice that we can give is to pick up your mail daily. If your mailbox is empty, this will deter anyone from repeating this offense. You might also consider purchasing a mailbox with a lock on it. This way Rob can deliver your mail to you, but only you will have access to it. Lastly, you could always open a PO Box in town. We have many available, but of course this comes with a fee. The peace of mind, knowing your mail is in our office, safe from thieves, might be worth the added cost.

What is up with all of the books on the counter in the lobby? This is our little self-service town library. Please feel free to take a book! Return it or keep it. Leave a book! Share reading material if you'd like. Our library is constantly changing and growing every day. So, if you see something you like, grab it! It will likely be gone on your next visit. Please do not leave any food items in the Post Office. This will attract bugs and who knows what other critters. If you have any food items you can always drop them off at the pantry located at the community church.

**How should I address my mail?** If you have a mailbox on the street then you simply put your first and last name or business name and your home address. Examples: John Doe 40555 Valley of the Falls Drive, Forest Falls, CA 92339. If you have a PO box in town you would address your mail: John Doe PO Box 999, Forest Falls, CA 92339.

What about companies that won't allow packages/mail to be sent to a PO Box? Then you would simply put your residential address with the # symbol and then your PO Box number. This gives the illusion that your PO Box number is an apartment or suite. John Doe 40555 Valley of the Falls Drive #999, Forest Falls, CA 92339. Another way you could also do this is to address your mail: John Doe 40555 Valley of the Falls Drive, Forest Falls, CA 92339-9998. In the last example you would put your PO Box number as the last 4 digits of your zip code. If your PO Box number is 20 then you would put 92339-0020. Just substitute the first 2 digits for zeros. This makes it a lot easier for us to deliver your mail.


It prevents mail from being delayed, mis-delivered or returned. Although Ken and I are knowledgeable on most of your names and PO boxes in town, there are days where we might have a substitute worker from a different office. They will be unfamiliar with the office so your mail could possibly be returned if your mail is not addressed correctly. So, the safest way to protect your mail is by providing your mailing address on your mail/packages... not your physical address. We would really appreciate your cooperation!

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## Wandering the Wilderness

We live in the midst of a National Forest, with the San Gorgonio Wilderness just to the north of Mill Creek and our town. Depending on where you live in Forest Falls, your own yard or garden or landscaping can create a small

section of wilderness. It is a wonderful feeling to be able to walk out your door and walk somewhere, into the forest, along the creek, or up a trail into the high country.



To borrow a line from a JRR Tolkien verse: "Not all those who wander are lost." I have spent many years hiking, wandering and meandering these mountains both on trail and cross country. A perfect day would be heading out before sunrise and get up into the high county, with no specific goal other than to be in the wilderness. Follow a deer trail, look for flowers or animal tracks, take a nap on the

pine needles, or whatever meandering brings to mind. No deadline to be home or miles to count or exercise goal to meet. And the only place I ever got lost was New York City. Never in any forest or desert or wilderness. Maybe inconvenienced (bushwhacking), scratched up and dirty. But not lost.

So here are some tips and ideas to make your own time in the forest and wilderness safer, more creative or meditative and an adventure:

• Learn to read a topographical map and use a compass. A real paper map and an actual compass. Not that GPS units, phones and satellite communicators are bad, they are useful. But they do not give you the BIG picture and they require batteries. The USGS 7.5 minute topo maps are a good starting point. A favorite book, the one I learned from, is Be Expert with Map and Compass, The Orienteering Handbook, by Bjorn Kjellstrom. It is still in print. And you can find many other resources on the subject. Practice looking at your surroundings and the finding points on the map.

- Get a compass with a mirror and a full 360 degree rotation. Learn the degrees for N, E, S, W. North is 360 degrees (or 0); E is 90 degrees; S is 180 degrees and W is 270 Degrees. Once you learn how to use the compass you can create fun treasure hunts. Creating a navigation course with "rewards" to be found at specific places, following specific compass bearings and walking a given number of steps. You can do this in your back yard. I wager your children might learn this faster than you!
- Learn how to identify the tracks of some of our local animals: black bear, raccoon, mule deer, Big Horn sheep, bobcat and mountain lion. See if you can tell the difference between the deer and Big Horn sheep. Look for tracks when you walk a trail or path. Winter time with a light snow makes tracks stand out. Find a guide with good photos or illustrations. Peterson's Guide to Animal Tracks is just one. Memorize what your boot or shoe tracks look like. When returning from a walk, see if you can "back track" yourself.
- Challenge yourself to find plants that display the "Golden Angle" or a Fibonacci sequence. The Golden Angle is 137.5 degrees, and a fibonacci sequence is: 0, 1, 1, 2, 3, 5, 8, 13, 21, 34... The next number is found by adding the 2 previous. So 21 + 34 = 55. And on and on. This creates a spiral. Start with a sunflower to see this fascinating pattern and then look for it in other plants.
- Walking is a boost to the spirit, body and mind. A book I have used for years is "Healing Walks for Hard Times" by Carolyn Scott Kortge. A program of walking, gradually increasing distance or time, but with attention to your steps and breathing. It is not about speed or "training". It is about creating calm and immersing yourself in natural surroundings.

Let go of fear of being outside. The more time you spend there, the more you will see and enjoy.

It was so good to see everyone out after having to skip a year. Thank you to all of the sponsors and our neighbors for making it a memorable event. ## **Obituary: Robert Dobias**

Robert "Bob" Dobias fell asleep in Jesus' arms on Monday, August 9, at home in Forest Falls – the canyon he loved so much. When we first moved to Forest Falls in 1973, Bob was working in La Sierra. Almost every day he would say how nice it was to come home to the mountains – to the peace and quiet and beauty. For 48 years he has never lost that wonderful feeling. Bob also loved people, and everyone he met became a friend. Occasionally at Christmastime when we were at home, he would play Santa Claus for the children in the neighborhood. He enjoyed serving on the Forest Park Water Board for several terms. He was active as Church Leader in the Seventh-Day Adventist Church for many years. His last church project, just before he was hospitalized, was securing a roofing contractor to re-roof the building, which he liked to call the "holiest church you'll ever attend" (due to the woodpecker holes on the east side of the building). In 1979 when the Community gathered together and determined to build the "new" Fallsvale School, Bob was the contractor of record for the project. He has always been very proud of the hard work the Community did to ensure our kids would have their school.

Bob is survived by his wife, Shirley (Charlie), of 49 years; his son Jim (wife Ekco) of Panama City, Florida; his daughter Shirlyn (husband Christopher) of Surrey, England; 3 grandchildren; 2 sisters, a sister-in-law and brother-in-law; many nieces, nephews and cousins. #### The Big Red Suitcase

At this very moment, I'm walking down Simon Bolivar in Cuenca, Ecuador, dragging an old ratty red suitcase behind me. This suitcase is the biggest you can take on an airplane without getting charged extra. Over the years this has become my favorite suitcase.

I'm looking for Mujeres con Exito. I always get lost when I'm in this neighborhood. Mujeres con Exito is one of my favorite charities. It's a place where women can find help for themselves and their children when they are coming out of a hopeless and sometimes dangerous situation. Prayers and hard work make this place possible.

I am having selfish thoughts again. I'm thinking about the free lunch I will be gifted when I arrive. Mujeres con Exito isn't just a shelter, but it's a diner that teaches their residents how to work, cook, and manage a restaurant. It's also a laundry. A working laundry that helps fund the charity, and it employs the women that are at the shelter. Pretty smart way to run a charity.

When I finally arrive I notice the restaurant is closed. Maybe I arrived a little early for lunch. I bang on the door and someone lets me in.

"Where is everyone?"

"Oh my gosh, it's George." Please come in, I'll get Diana.

Something is different here.

But not Diana's smile when she greets me. It is perfect.

And the hug, no one hugs like Diana. She was so excited to see me. She insisted on showing me the classrooms upstairs where the children are learning. She mentions how important the media projectors are that our group donated last year, just before Covid.

But there are only 5 children in the one classroom. Where are the other 100 plus children? And where are the moms and the babies?

After a little interrogation and a lot of tears, I was told that Covid had caused the closing of the restaurant and the laundry. No work means no money. The government has very little money now, so financial support has been cut in half, while the need has doubled because of the pandemic. This group of volunteers is overwhelmed.

We sat and talked for a few minutes about their plan to reopen and then I was asked, "what's in the red suitcase?"

I was excited to tell Diana and the rest of the crew that this was a small gift from my community back in the States. I opened the case and everyone started to smile. And they were all happy smiles. The case was full of shoes. Baby shoes, toddler shoes, kids cowboy boots, moccasins, all

shoes for the children, donated by generous people from right here in Forest Falls, Angelus Oaks, and Mountain Home Village. In ad-

dition, hidden under the shoes were baby clothes.

This small gift from our community to theirs made a giant difference to this group of volunteers. I could see the hope come back into their eyes. I swear there was a little miracle here.

The next day I sat with my friend Alberto and asked if the Pizza Project could donate something to help the kitchen at Mujeres con Exito get off to a quick start. Without hesitation he went out and purchased 50 kilos of flour, 50 kilos of rice and 50 kilos of bean, along with many other much needed food supplies. Thank you Pizza Project donors.


This little miracle in Ecuador started right here in our mountain community, from that very first person who donated that first pair of baby shoes.

And it goes with me every time I visit Ecuador.












ABLE TO HELP? The Community Food Pantry operates
