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Seven Oaks Flood Recovery

February 14th 2019 is a day that many local mountain residents will not soon forget. Not for the flowers and candy that are supposed to bring in the day, but for the torrential flooding that took place. Our communities where hit hard. The combination of snow on the ground, then warm rain that fell all the way to 9,000 feet, caused a huge amount of runoff in a very short period of time. Forest Falls had extensive damage, but one small community was hit unbelievably hard, and didn't get the coverage that other places received: Seven Oaks.

Our local community activist and favorite person, Forest Falls resident Linda Jones asked me to take a break from helping out some of the people in Forest Falls and come take a look at Seven Oaks to see if there was a way to help. I have been going to Seven Oaks since I was a young lad for camping and fishing. As we started down the steep Glass Road it was becoming evident that it wasn't going to be good. Linda's Jeep made it through the worst of it, and as we neared the Seven Oaks Resort, I fought back the tears. Complete devastation. Words do it so little justice, the power of the water and a whole community just ripped apart by one storm. I was quickly introduced to Greg and Malissa Fink, owners and operators of the Seven Oaks Resort. As we talked my heart broke. Greg lost his father just days before the flood. Greg's father bought the resort 40 years ago. It was his home and Greg has spent his adult life helping out around the resort and taking over once Dad decided to retire. Malissa told us the harrowing tale of being trapped in their home as the Santa Ana River cut off their only access, jumped the banks, and started eating away at the dike that kept the river out of their living room. For 36 hours they just huddled in their home as the foundation of their home shook from rocks, some the size of cars, tumbled just 100 feet away. When the water started to go down, the damage was clear. The river was just feet from jumping the final berm and taking out the house, and quite possibly their lives. Where the campground once was, over 300 fallen trees now lay, piles of debris 30 feet tall, and the

Aussie Ladybugs Love Mill Creek Canyon

Folklore: the traditional beliefs, customs, and stories of a community, passed through the generations by word of mouth. The following bit of folklore has been passed down in various forms, but what you read here comes from my memory as passed down from some of the previous Canyon elders, including Chester and Richard Gillmore, plus a little help from a Google search.



In the late 1880's, when the citrus crop from Redlands to Riverside was becoming a booming enterprise, the fruit was attacked by an aphid the local ladybugs would not eat. As this blight spread and threatened to destroy the groves, biologists took a sailing ship to Australia where many of the orange trees had been imported from and were able to locate the ladybug species that thrived on this aphid.

Spay/Neuter Your Pets

Pet overpopulation is a worldwide epidemic. Hard statistics aren't easy to come by, but it is estimated over 4 million domestic cats and dogs are euthanized every single year in the United States alone. 8 million dogs and cats enter the shelter system every year. More than half won't make it out alive. Your tax-payer dollars account for \$1 billion dollars annually for animal control to pick up, house and kill homeless animals. If only 5% of that money were allocated to spay/neuter programs, the US could sterilize more than 4 million animals each year. We cannot adopt our way out of the pet overpopulation epidemic. The only way to "fix" the problem is to "fix" our pets.

The health benefits of spay/neutering your pet will save you in vet bills. Examples of these benefits include:

 Your female dog will live longer and have less of a chance of getting uterine infections and breast tumors

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Returning to the Inland Empire the Aussie aphids were introduced and saved the crops in record time.

Somehow these Aussie ladybugs made their way into upper Mill Creek Canyon where to this day they hibernate and breed in the higher elevations of our community. Snow Canyon seems to be their favorite winter residence but often handfuls can be found under deep snow in your yard where they seem to like buried vinca plants and ivy. If you discover them, gently pick up a handful and wait for them to come alive as the warmth of your body triggers them into activity.

When the Spring temperatures reach around 70° downtown the annual migration begins as waves of the little critters make their journey to the valley orange groves over a few weeks. There is no evidence of a return route which suggests that each year the breeding takes place in the Canyon for the following years migration. Some ladybugs stay behind and take care of our plants and gardens as evidenced by the photo taken in our yard a few years back.

Our ladybugs don't "bite" but rather produce an enzyme to dissolve its prey which feels like a small bite on your skin. A group of ladybugs is called a "loveliness of ladybugs". Sunset magazine once labeled Forest Falls as the "Ladybug Capitol of the West Coast".

Sidebar... After the citrus industries rapid recovery, in 1891 more than two thousand rail cars left from California's citrus belt sidings headed back East. The ice to protect the crop was first produced by a ice house in Mentone who received its power from Southern California Edison who supplied the first "three phase" power west of the Mississippi from Mill Creek power plant #1, a building that still stands today Northeast of "Edge wild" and just across Mill Creek with an original hydro power generator sitting idle on display near others who continue to produce electricity for us all.

- Neutering your male animal prevents testicular cancer and some prostate problems.
- Your spayed female pet won't go into heat. In their effort to advertise for mates, they'll yowl and urinate more frequently all over your house!
- Your male dog will be less likely to escape and roam away from home. An intact male will do just about anything to find a mate, including finding creative ways escape from the house. Once he's free to roam, he risks being killed by traffic and fights with other male animals.
- Your neutered male may be better behaved. Unneutered
 dogs and cats are more likely to mark their territory by
 spraying strong-smelling urine all over the house. Your dog
 might be less likely to mount other dogs, people and inanimate objects after he's neutered. No one wants to be
 mounted by your dog when they come to visit!
- Some aggression problems may be avoided by neutering.
- Spaying/neutering your pets is also highly cost-effective.
 The cost of your pet's spay/neuter surgery is far less than the cost of having and caring for a litter.

Do yourself, your pet and your community a service by spay/ neutering your animals. If you cannot afford the cost of the surgery with your vet, there are several options available:






CRY NO MORE by Linda Howard

CRY NO MORE was on the New York Times Best Seller list. I could care less about this list. But, a friend of mine highly recommended the book before I knew it had made the New York Times and I furiously read it. I loved "the delicious ache of the last page."

Milla Edge is the director of FINDING, a non-profit organization she began; finding lost children and teens, lost husbands, wandering elderly. This is her passion and fervent commitment in



life. Her elite passion is finding kidnapped babies which motivates her following dangerous ventures across the border from Texas into Mexico.

Sometimes Milla's "finding" travels place her in harm's way; that's why she carries a gun. She encounters two powerful men both dangerous; wealthy billionaire True Gallagher (beware that name) who wants her or wants to kill her, and the invisible, dangerous Diaz, a mercenary or government agent????? Diaz and Milla meet, make a contract and travel intensely to find her real heart-passion, a son who was snatched out of her arms 10 years earlier at a market in Mexico when he was just six weeks old. She and her doctor husband were living there working at a medical clinic. Diaz and Milla's search is for a devious one-eyed man. Emotional surprises await the reader.

In trying to find out what happened to her lost baby, Milla rides -out a divorce from her doctor husband who cannot bear her determined struggle to find their son. Milla travels to fundraise for FINDING and travels in the darkest of nights across the border on tips that she will find a ring of abductors. But there becomes something even more dangerous than kidnapped babies. This is a compelling and scary novel. Howard's two main characters, Milla and Diaz are "scarefully" developed and complete opposites. The reader never knows when Diaz will show up. Mexico fears him. So does the reader!

One reviewer stated, "...from the chapter where the baby is stolen to the last chapter page, I could not put it down." My "sit on the edge of my seat" scene was when Milla and Diaz were caught in white rapids, fighting to survive and the descriptive breath-taking (literally) struggle. This story-part caught my gasp!

So many jolts in this "quest" novel, especially at the end! This is a "must" read. Oh yes, and there is also "hot" romance to keep those pages turning. Good read for a cold day on the mountain, but be ready to cry.

Mill Creek Canyon CERT

Spring can come in like a lamb and go out like a LION in Mill Creek Canyon. Warmer air, such as what occurs in the Spring actually can hold much more moisture than colder air. When you think of winter, our minds naturally equate to storms. The truth is, the colder air is not capable of holding nearly as much water vapor.

What is the point of all of this you ask? Do not be lulled into a sense of security March through May as far as snowfall is concerned. When warmer air from the "Pineapple Express" collides with a cold air mass coming down from Alaska, the result can be huge snowfall totals because the cold air cannot carry the extra moisture.

Make sure that you are still prepared for the rest of the season. Stock up on firewood and propane. Pack a "go" bag with you when you leave the canyon and make arrangements with your friends or neighbors for the care of your pets in case you stuck down the hill, you may not be able to get home for a few days.

Don't forget about ice. If you don't know the classic, "known problem" areas for ice formation on the roadways in Mill Creek Canyon, ask a long-term resident. Or, better yet, when you call me to sign up for our next Basic C.E.R.T. Course I can tell you what I know about them.

The Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) program educates volunteers about disaster preparedness for the hazards that may impact their area and trains them in basic disaster re-

sponse skills, such as fire safety, light search and rescue, team organization, and disaster medical operations. 2019 Alarm Review: San Bernardino County firefighters from the Forest Falls Station 99 responded to 230 alarms in 2019. A considerable decrease rom 2018. Why the decrease? We believe two reasons: 1. Big Falls remains closed in the upper reach above the Observation Point and Medic Engine 9 from Mentone is now routinely responded to most alarms in Angelus Oaks, reducing the number of times we were dispatched to a MA in AO These MA Cancelled Enroute call totals are not included in the Cancelled Enroute totals contained in the grid below.

EMS, Emergency Medical Service, calls continue to dominate the Fire Service, when you include the alarms that extended beyond a MA and demanded EMS in conjunction with a Traffic Collision, Rescue or Fire the percentage of EMS calls reaches 55 to 60% of annual alarms. From the breakdown on page 14 (See Station 99 Alarm Summary on page 14) you can see how the numbers change from year to year. Our readiness, however, remains 24/7/365. My annual thanks to all the community Fire Fighters and those who support our service to others in need.

Firehouse Projects: The new microwave communications tower is online and running smooth, allowing us to transition to the new digital communications network and vastly increasing our operational and safety platform. Prior to this change, if a firefighter were lost, injured or trapped there was no clean way to send out the alarm. Now, simply pressing an emergency button on our radio sends a signal to dispatch that starts a rescue procedure without delay. Additionally, everyday communications were greatly enhanced. "I can you hear you now?".









Firefighter Training, comings and goings: Congratulations once again to Firefighter Dave Druck for having completed the second Driver Operator course, D/O 1B. This 40 hour training held at the Calimesa Fire Department dealt primarily with Fire Engine pump operations from the basic ground fire to a complicated multistory evolution. Most every Fire Station 99 firefighter completed the Phase 1 live burn component of Modern Fire Behavior and soon will go through the Phase 2 "live fire attack" provided by our Training Division cadre.

Congrats also to those who recently completed an intensive five week Public Safety First Responder EMS course. Graduates include; **Driver Operator Thom Wellman**, and **Firefighters Misha Boiarski**, **Lloyd Sherman**, **John Ranabauer** and **Jorge Mandujano**. Also taking the course are our two new hire applicants; **Kristi Ranabauer** and **Eddie Herrera** whom we expect will be joining Company 99 soon.

Sadly it is time to say farewell to retiring 13 year veteran **Firefighter Terry Uldricks**. And Farewell to **Firefighter Jordan Schaefer** as Jordan transitions to a career as a full-time Ambulance Operator and soon as a regular Firefighter with our San Bernardino County Fire Department.

First stop is **Jenks Lake West.** There are two 'loop trails' here, one on each side of the highway, named "Ponderosa" and "Whispering Pines". Each are about 0.5 miles in length. The Whispering Pines trail is noted for being featured in a 1969 episode of the "Lassie" TV show, https://youtu.be/x0MGCfNitKI and because of that has interpretive signs in Braille, a unique feature on any trail on the SBNF. During Snow Season, this area is called the Barton Flats Snow Play Area, which is officially designated by the U.S. Forest Service. The area is a favorite destination for that fun time in the Winter!! (This was news to me, because I thought all the snow players from down the hill came to Forest Falls or the AO or just stopped on the Highway!) The area is defined as the only legal snow-play parking area on the National Forest between Jenks Lake West and Jenks Lake East. Feel free to recommend it!

Continuing to the right, **JLW** will take you around a peaceful loop toward **Jenks Lake**. You will notice several signs of local group camps as you drive. **Jenks Lake** is a seasonal fishing area with canoeing and kayaking. They closed as of October 6th but will reopen next April, in 2020. Jenks Lake offers fishing from its pier, along with fishing pads along the shore. The California Department of Fish and Wildlife plants rainbow trout twice a month in spring and summer. There are abundant picnic tables, fire rings, restrooms and trails to walk. There is a \$5.00 entrance fee for cars. Hours are from 7 am to 6 pm. If you haven't met the Jenks Lake Hosts, Bob Halloran and Stephanie and Lisa Rector, you are in for a treat!! Their hospitality is warm and wonderful! And you will meet them next April! https://www.facebook.com/pages/Jenks-


As you continue around the loop, you will see the **South Fork Trailhead** parking lot, 2.5 miles from Highway 38 on **JLW**, which will take you up to the **San Gorgonio Wilderness**. Along the way you will pass the entrance to the famous "Poop Out Hill" https://abhiking.blogspot.com/2011/10/poop-out-hill-san-bernardino-national.html

The SGW is a huge attraction and there are many trails to hike to the peak. Be sure you are prepared for inclement weather and get the proper permits from the Mill Creek Ranger Station. For more information, check out the San Gorgonio Wilderness Association (SGWA) http://sgwa.org/wilderness-permits/ The Wilderness starts on the western slope of the San Bernardino Mountains. On February 12, 2016, President Obama signed a proclamation creating the Sand to Snow National Monument which comprises 154,000 acres on the Sonoran Desert floor up to over 10,000 feet in the San Bernardino National Forest. From the U.S. Forest Service: "The striking diversity of lands within this monument is breathtaking-they are filled with the stories of ancient peoples, soaring mountain peaks, critical wildlife corridors and rich biological diversity. The San Gorgonio Mountain region serves as an important recreational hub for 24 million people living within a two-hour drive of the area." Our California Senator, Dianne Feinstein pushed this legislation through to save a large part of the **SG Wilderness** for the future San Gorgonio Mountain and Wilderness area. Mount San Gorgonio or "Old Greyback" is the highest peak in Southern California and the Transverse Ranges are 11,503 feet. A wilderness area is a region where the land is in a natural state; where impacts from human activity is minimal. https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Sand to Snow National Monument

The Barton Flats Visitors Center is at the entrance to the area's tent/RV campgrounds. The Visitor Center is located just off Highway 38. Many local wildlife fauna and flora from the San Bernardino Museum are on display. The San Gorgonio Wilderness Association develops and presents interpretive programs for over 1,000 children each year. Informal Astronomy viewings at the Greyback Amphitheatre are popular due to no city light pollution. https://www.facebook.com/pages/Greyback-Ampitheater/192615997478311. BFVC offers a unique view of the Sand to Snow National Monument too. Some of the tent/RV camps are Barton Flats, Council Group, Heart Bar, Lobo/Oso Group, San Gorgonio, South Fork and Wild Horse Equestrian Campgrounds. Call to check on availability and for more information 909-794-4861.

As you travel along Highway 38, turn left on Glass Road, and follow it down to **The Seven Oaks Mountain Resort.** The Resort is situated in the Santa Ana River Canyon, four miles below Highway 38. They are a private, seasonal resort, open from April to October each year. It sits on the Santa Ana River which is a local fishing favorite. The community of Seven Oaks is located roughly halfway between Highway 38 and the Bear Creek/Santa Ana River confluence. The Resort offers great camping spots, and a fun restaurant and bar open Fridays, Saturdays and Sundays. Grab a delicious burger or patty melt with a side of 'frings' (french fries and onion rings) with beer or wine all summer long. It's a cool place to hang out, and mountain people watch! Once again, Mountain CARE, the organization who publishes The Bear Facts and runs our community web cam network, will coordinate many of the activities comprising our annual Canyon Cleanup event. For those of you new to our town, Canyon Cleanup is a time when our local residents come together to



pick up trash, clean graffiti, and collect recyclables. This year Canyon Cleanup will take place on Saturday, May 16.

Like in past years, Burrtec will donate several large dumpsters for large junk items, green waste, and recyclables. The primary drop-off site for these types of items will be at the cinder pile just above "the Y" outside of Forest Falls. The e-waste drop-off site will likely be at Fallsvale School, and extra dumpsters for large junk items will be located in Mountain Home village and at the Community Center in Forest Falls.

We tried to work with San Bernardino County to include a household hazardous waste site in one of our towns. But due to their increasingly stringent requirements, we were unable to accomplish this. But on May 16, the day of Canyon Cleanup, you can take your household hazardous waste to Redlands:
