Supervisor Announces Availability of FEMA Aid

by the County Supervisor Dawn Rowe's Office (edited)

Supervisor Dawn Rowe announces availability of FEMA and other Federal and State Aid to Mountain Communities. Mountain residents, property owners, and businesses affected by the late winter blizzard are now eligible for assistance from state and federal agencies, including FEMA, that's to the efforts of Board of Supervisors Chair, Dawn Rowe, and various County agencies who advocated and worked closely with state and federal decision makers to secure aide for local communities.

Acting on a county emergency declaration made under Rowe's leadership and then a request by the Governor, FEMA added San Bernardino County to the Presidential Major Disaster Declaration approved by the President. Providing San Bernardino County residents, property owners, and businesses with access to additional state and federal aid and recovery resources.

"I am pleased that the state and federal governments have acknowledged the magnitude of this disaster," said Chair Rowe, whose Third District includes the areas that were hit the hardest by the winter storms. "I will continue to do everything I can to advocate for our mountain residents and businesses as they try to recover."

FEMA's Individual Assistance program makes affected residents eligible to apply for grants to help pay for temporary housing and essential home repairs as well as other serious disasterrelated needs, such as replacement of damaged personal property and expenses for transportation, childcare, moving and storage.

Homeowners and renters seeking assistance are encouraged to begin the process by registering with FEMA, the Federal Emergency Management Agency, at https://www.disasterassistance.gov/, through the FEMA mobile app, or by calling the FEMA helpline at 1-800-621-3361.

Applicants receiving an initial rejection are encouraged to visit the soon-to=be-established Disaster Recovery Center (DRC). The DRC will open at a location in the mountain communities and hose representatives from a full slate of state and federal agencies who will help residents and property owners, including those who are







initially rejected, with any and all forms of assistance available to them. The location and operating hours of the DRC will be announced when a site is secured.

Businesses and nonprofit agencies, including churches, are encouraged to register with the U.S. small Business Administration at https://disasterloanassistance.sba.gov/. Applicants may also call SBA's Customer Service Center at 1-800-659-2955 or email <u>disastercustomerservice@sba.gov</u> for more information on SBA disaster assistance. Residents and businesses are advised that state and federal resources will likely not provide 100 percent coverage for damage and other losses. It is important for property owners to work with their personal insurance companies.

THE ONLY WOMAN IN THE ROOM
by Marie Benedict



Mussolini, SS Officers, Hitler, a woman fleeing from the castle of her wealthy husband where she was sometimes locked in and watched by a servant; a woman smoking on the balcony behind a wall listening to

secret plans discussed by important men after a dinner party; a film screen star, a movie called ecstasy; and (what???) a scientist; meet Hedy Lamarr, The Only Woman in the Room.

My mother adored Hedy Lamarr, her life and her movies. After watching a movie together on Turner Classics, mom told me that "Hedy Lamarr's stunning beauty was a farce. Her real beauty was her mind!" Then she asked me if I knew that Hedy was a scientist and may have contributed to our communication technology today. My mom was a reader, and I donated many books to Smiley Library and CSUSB's Library which included several books about,



guess who? The book by Benedict justified my mother's suggestion about Lamarr's stunning and clever mind!

Benedict's novel is considered Historical Fiction. She rotates facts into telling a good story based on a true story. For instance, Lamarr had an idea that might tumble the nazi's. But (think about this after reading the book) there was an active war going on! This glamorous, innovative Hollywood icon who refused to be pushed aside, solidified my mother's words. "Lamarr's beauty WAS a farce. Her real beauty WAS her mind."

Benedict's book is a page turner and gives the reader motivation to research further about Hollywood's screen star, Hedy Lamarr. Benedict writes the scenario of a famous, complicated woman who was a genius, an astounding and venust figure prominent in history and a legend in Hollywood. The author's note in the back states, "We hold a piece of women's history in our hands every day. I do not mean this in a metaphorical sense but quite literally. Every day, nearly every one of us holds a piece of history created, in roundabout fashion, by Hedy Lamarr."

Here is a quote from the New York Times book review:

"In Marie Benedict's telling, the story is a ready-made thriller as well as a feminist parable as well."

This book motivated me to 1) watch the documentary on Netflix called Bombshell which is narrated by her children 2) read Carnegie's Maid and The Other Einstein, both by Benedict and 3) I just bought Lady Clementine. This book is about Winston Churchill's wife also by the same author. I am hooked.

I hope this review motivates you all to a good summer read and to become the "only READER in the room."

Wild Winter Brings Woes to Snow Canyon

As you're reading this it's getting warmer and you're probably trading your snow boots in for sandals. Creeks are flowing better than ever and there's an abundance of fresh green growth in our canyon. This is great for our mountain, but it wasn't this way a couple months ago. As we all know, mother nature came in full force this year holding zero punches. So much so, in the first week in March we had a very large avalanche come down Snow Canyon. For those not familiar, Snow Canyon is located just East of Spring Lane in upper canyon. This area is also the present location of several water tanks and source infrastructure for the Fallsvale Service Co. Water is sourced through a horizontal well

drilled into the hog back just below Yucaipa ridge just shy of 7000 feet elevation. From there on down it's all gravity fed to our town and service lines. Pretty amazing feat if you think about it. On approx March 1-2nd a large avalanche came down the West Chute which had no other place to travel but down Snow Creek Canyon

proper. It took out the water supply lines and tossed and rolled the 20,000 gallon tanks like they were nothing. It sloughed up to our 140,000 gallon main tank burying it like it was nothing and in turn damaging the surrounding steel panels of the tank. Fire station 99 escorted the water company board members, county officials and firefighters via snowcat for an assessment on the task ahead. It was devastating to see the damage that occurred and it was declared a disaster with the County almost immediately. So much snow had come down there is still an ongoing mission to get all the damage assessed while I write this. In the coming months, the board and the water crews will be working diligently to get our Snow Canyon feeds back up and running. In the meantime, we are pumping off the vertical well at the top of Island drive and have contingency plans in place for any speed bumps that may arise. We are also working with officials for financial help/reimbursement as we don't want the burden on our share-holders anymore than we have too. In closing, i want to thank all of our share holders for your great understanding of the situation and if anyone has any questions you can contact any one of us board members.





The Propagation of Plants

I have always loved to propagate plants. The main reason why I love it is because my birthday gifts and other occasion gifts to my friends are from my propagated plants. I learned how to use the water method because my mother always did it that way. She did it with fruit trees and is still doing it.



What are the three types of propagation?

Cuttings involve rooting a severed piece of the parent plant; **Layering** involves rooting a part of the parent and then severing it; and **Budding** and **Grafting** is joining two plant parts from different varieties.

How can you propagate?

You can propagate with seeds or roots, but the easiest and most common method is by cutting, or transferring a piece of a mature plant into water or soil and letting it grow a new root system. To propagate plants you can do it by water or soil. In my personal experience, I have been doing it by water only, which works especially for my indoor plants. Also, I have done

it many times with my geraniums. This time I-m trying by soil. I got 2 Rosemary stems and 2 Morning Glory leaves. On Monday April 17 at the Frozen Green Thumb Garden Club meeting, we had a Master Gardener, Maggie O'Neill, talk about propagation. She explained about using the soil and an appropriately sized pot. She also recommended a plant hormone to assist root growth. A PowerPoint presentation from Maggie is posted on our Frozen Green Thumb Garden Club Facebook Page. Feel free to look for it; propagation info starts about slide 13.

Where do you cut for propagation?

Using a sharp knife (or pruners) cut **just below where a leaf attaches to the stem (the node)**. Roots grow easiest from this location. If you leave a section of stem below the node, it often rots. Remove the lower leaves but leave the top two or three. If the stems have bark, scratch the bark, because roots will only come from where there isn't bark.

Can all plants be propagated?


Some, but not all, plants can be propagated from just a leaf or a section of a leaf. Also, almost any garden plant that produces stems can be propagated via stem cuttings: Perennial flowers, vines, shrubs, and even trees are all great candidates! Now that we have general information about propagation, we can have more of our favorite plants. Good luck in propagating.

Have You Seen It?

Usually, for the Summer Edition of The Bear Facts, I write about Oscar nominees/ winners from the previous year so you can rent or stream them if you choose. In the last *Bear Facts*, my husband, Steve, wrote about our favorite film of 2022, The Fableman's which was nominated

but didn't win for Best Picture. "Everything Everywhere All At Once (EEAAO)" won Best Picture of 2022. Steve and I viewed EEAAO as a unique, surreal and chaotic movie, more confusing than enjoyable. Our son, age 42, thought it was about the best movie he has ever seen! So, I'll write about movies we've seen at the theater in 2023 that we really liked and recommend to our friends. Now that streaming access to recently released movies is common. I don't need to focus on movies to rent. (In fact, NETFLIX announced in April that it's ceasing its DVD business as of Sept. 2023.)

A Man Called Otto (PG13; released late 2022; 7.4/10 critics,



4.5/5 audience) This film, starring Tom Hanks as Otto, a just-retired, cantankerous, self-isolated man amidst caring neighbors. Through flashbacks (featuring Hanks' real-life son as the young Otto), the reasons for Otto's depression and anger are revealed. Otto's bleakness is countered by a new neighbor, Marisol (played by bilingual Mariana Trevito and, to me, the best character and actor in this movie). This American movie is based on the

award-winning Swedish novel by Fredrick Beckman and 2015 Swedish film, both called A Man Named Ove..

Shazam! Fury of the Gods! (PG13; released March 2023; 6.1/10 critics, 7/10 audience) I recommend you see the first Shazam

movie (released 2019) to better understand the background and the characters before seeing this movie, a sequel. To Steve and me, this is a family-friendly movie, as long as you have mature upper-elementary and above members of your family viewing. Ther3e is a lot of fantasy-like violence but also so much down-to-earth humor and character development, especially among the main characters—Foster Home teens who are able to turn into adult super-heroes.



Air (R; released April 2023; 7.7/10 critics, 4.4/5 audience) This film has a great, top-performing cast, including Matt Damon, Viola Davis, Ben Affleck, and Jason Bateman. The movie centers on the emergence of basketball's Michael Jordan and Nike shoes into fame. The film does not focus on Jordan, but rather on NIKE's sports marketing man, Sonny Vaccaro (played by Damon) who realizes the greatness of the rookie Jordan and learns to be on an equal par with Jordan's mom (played by Davis). Dreams and ambitions coincide to a history-making outcome for the sports world. Another highlight of the film for us "old timers" are the 1980's soundtrack and flashing images of news, cars, toys (Remember the Cabbage Patch dolls?), etc.
