## The Momyer Trail

This is one of the most underused trails in the San Gorgonio Wilderness within the Sand to Snow National Monument. This area offers the visitor solitude and good views of Mill Creek Canyon and Yucaipa Ridge from the upper end of the trail.

In 1939, under a then new Forest Service regulation, unbroken tracts between 5 and 100 thousand acres could be declared "Wild Areas". By 1955, the Primitive Area had now become the San Gorgonio Wild Area. No protest of any kind was received against the designation, although the region was still too small to qualify as federal wilderness.

By December 1962, the continuing threat from ski associations prompted the formation of the Defenders of the San Gorgonio Wilderness, an amazing group headed by Harry James and Joe Momyer (a retired San Bernardino postal superintendent) and secretary Alice Krueper.



The trail is named after Joe Momyer. (Pronounced: MO-my-ur). Joe fought to protect the San Gorgonio Wilderness from development in the 1960s and lobbied for inclusion of the primitive area in the Wilderness Act of 1964.

The trailhead (1E06) is reached by turning east off Highway 38 to Forest Falls, continue up the road two miles to the large parking area (5,400') on your left 100 yards before you reach the fire station. There are no restrooms at this trailhead, but restrooms can be used at the Big Falls Picnic Area another mile further up the road.

The trail first descends to Mill Creek wash and you must cross the creek. There is no bridge so please

exercise extreme caution and it is recommended that you do not cross when the water level is high.

Alger Creek Camp (7,100') is 3.7 miles from



the wash. The single site is located about 0.25 miles below the trail. Two miles further is Dobbs Camp (water available-7,200'). Another 1.5 miles is Saxton Camp (8,400'). Water here is obtained from a small spring 0.2 mile below the camp along the trail. Two miles further is Dollar Lake Saddle (9,960 feet, no water).

Day use permits are required and have been since the beginning of September, 2020. For overnight permits, reserve through the San Gorgonio Wilderness Association.

- Group size limited to 12 people and 8 pack/ riding animals per group.
- No campfires allowed. Portable gas stoves are allowed.
- There are No restrooms
- Camp on a durable surface at least 100 feet away from trails and water sources.

- Keep foliage clean.

- If you are prone to watering too much, buy a moisture meter.

2022 Alarm Review San Bernardino Fire District, Forest Falls Station 99 had a quieter 2022 while the length or complexity of some of the alarms were beyond the norm. Over the past decade our "request for service" or alarms averaged about 260 per year with 2018 jumping to 315 alarms and now that

2022 is in the bag, total alarms were 186. Here is the breakdown:

**Medical Aid:** 95 or 52% of total alarms in which we were Cancelled Enroute 7 times, mostly for calls responding to Angelus Oaks when Sta 98 did not need our assistance.

**Rescue:** 12 or 7%, 7 of which were in Big Falls of which 6 where Hoist Rescues and 2 involved multiple patients. The upper reach of Big Falls remained closed in 2022 which we believe accounted for a reduction in Rescue alarms there.

**Traffic Collision:** 27 or 9% with 20 involving injuries where we were Cancelled Enroute 9 times, 3 Over the Side, 1 requiring extrication and 3 being non-injury.

**Fire:** 24 or 13%, 4 Structure Fires, 4 Vehicle Fires, 6 Wildland Fires, 7 Illegal Fires (camping/warming) 2 Truck Fires, 1 Commercial Fire Outside Investigation, 16 or 18%. **Inside Investigation:** 5 or 2%. Other, 7 or 3% including 2 Public Service, 2 HazMat, 2 ZAP (wires down) and 1 Wind Storm.

Chipper Daze: After decades of having Chipper Service provided by our County Fire crews the Fall 2022 event was cancelled due to budget and time constraints. It is possible we will only have Chipper Daze 1 time a year, in the Spring, so create your defensible space and get your piles built for April or May chipping.

#### Middle Control Road Closed

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Fire hardened means your home is prepared for wildfire and an ember storm. It does not mean fireproof. Home hardening addresses the most vulnerable components of your house

with building materials and installation techniques that increase resistance to heat, flames, and embers that accompany most wildfires.

#### KEY ELEMENTS OF A DEFENSIBLE SPACE

- Keep your gutters and roofs clear of leaves and debris.
- Maintain a 10-foot noncombustible zone around your home and deck.
- Break up fuel by creating space between plants, and between the ground and the branches of trees.
- Keep mulch away from the house. Bark mulch helps plants retain water but ignites and becomes flying embers during a wind-driven fire. During a wildfire move anything burnable—such as patio furniture or gas BBQ tanks—30 feet away from structures.

We've learned from recent fires that hardening your home and keeping the 10 feet closest to your house clear of flammable materials greatly improves the chance of surviving a fire. Maintaining defensible space is the law within 100 feet of a home in wildfire-prone areas, and highly recommended elsewhere. If a garage, shed, your neighbor's house or the property line is closer than 100 feet, it is especially important to "harden" the home itself to reduce vulnerability to radiant heat, and to work together with your neighbors to reduce risk—a great way to build community while protecting assets.

The California Fire Safe Council (CFSC) helps coordinate a strong network of partnerships with local, regional, state, and national organizations in order to help California residents acquire the education, resources, and tools they need to be better prepared for wildfire.

Angelus Oaks Fire Safe Council is currently looking for individuals who can spare a couple of hours a month by joining our group. We assist our community by providing available programs on Dead Tree Removal, Weed Abatement and Chipping. Our Fire Safe Council covers all communities within the 92305 areas. 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Hello Friends and Neighbors! So many new folks in town the last couple of years, lots of new faces and talent, all adapting to the unique challenges of mountain living. With COVID largely in our rear-view mirror, and access to our Community Center getting back to normal, it's time to celebrate the magic of living in paradise together! The COVID regulations for gathering places such as community centers hit very hard, but we're resilient and have made it through to the other side.

For those who don't know, VFCCi is the non-profit 501c3 which owns and operates "Big Falls Lodge", YOUR community center. It's a great place for meetings, classes and private events. Our board of directors are members of the community who volunteer their time and expertise to keep the doors open to all. Whenever crises occur, VFCCi is there to support outside groups who come to our aid. We are always open to new ideas for use of the building, so if you have a great passion – let us know what it is – let's do it!

We are looking for community members who want to serve on committees to realize their visions. We also need help for our fundraisers and ideas for new fundraisers, as expenses have skyrocketed in the last couple of years. Our long-time insurance company was forced to drop our fire coverage (like many of you) after the 2020 Apple and El Dorado fires. So we too are now on CA Fair Plan, which has more than tripled our annual insurance cost.

In July 2022, VFCCi was awarded a county grant for building improvements largely due to the efforts of Supervisor Dawn Rowe. Look for some much-needed capital improvements to our kitchen and building, coming soon. It's an old building and needs a lot of love. Our operational costs however, are not included

in those grant funds, so we rely primarily on fundraisers. Our next big fundraiser is Mountain Jamboree, this year on SUN JULY 2 – so tell your friends and family! We could use some help with the kids games, food, set up and clean up, and everything else that goes into making the day great for everyone. I've heard from many new residents "how can I get involved"? First and foremost, get to know your near neighbors - they have experience living here and will happily share their knowledge. They're also your first line of defense when circumstances dictate you're staying home (or if you get trapped away from home). Attend community events and meet your not-so-near neighbors, you'll quickly find who you "gel" with. Another great way to be involved is to join a CERT program. Community Emergency Response Teams are an excellent way to learn survival skills, as well as specific history for our area and what to do when things get out of control around here. VFCCi is the fiscal sponsor of CERT and we work closely together. A website few may be aware of with live updates and a huge amount of local information for emergency preparedness, is **vfccibeprepared.info** – check it out.

Other groups in town that use Big Falls Lodge for their purposes include Fallsvale School Booster Club, San Gorgonio Search and Rescue, Forest Falls Firefighters Association, Mountain C.A.R.E., Frozen Green Thumb Garden Club. These are all great groups to get to know.


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## Our Congressional and State Legislative Representatives

After the 2022 election, our mountain communities have some continuing elected representatives and some new ones. The California Redistricting Commission created new districts, which is done every ten years after the new federal census. Republican U.S. Representative Jay Obernolte continues to be our Member of Congress after he was re-elected. Although the boundaries of his district changed he continues to represent the entire San Bernardino Mountain region and parts of the desert region. His new district added Yucaipa and part of Redlands. He is a member of the House Committee on Natural Resources and the Subcommittee on National Parks, Forests and Public Lands. His official website is https://obernolte.house.gov/. Republican State Senator Rosilicie Ochoa-Bogh continues to represent our area in the California State Senate. She was not up for re-election in 2022 as she is in the middle of her four year term. She will be up for re-election in 2024 in a district that includes all the San Bernardino Mountain region as well as some parts of Riverside County and San Bernardino County. Her official website is https://ochoa-bogh.cssrc.us/.

Regarding our representatives in the California Assembly, the situation is a bit confusing. There are some rather odd district boundary lines created by the Redistricting Commission. Forest Falls and Mountain Home Village, but not Angelus Oaks, are in a new Assembly district that stretches from Redlands to Palm Springs. Republican Greg Wallis was elected in that district. He is a new Assembly Member. He was previously the District Director for former Assemblymember Chad Mayes of Palm Springs who declined to run for re-election in 2024. The official website for Wallis is https://ad47.asmrc.org/. Angelus Oaks is in a new Assembly district that includes Big Bear, Lake Arrowhead, parts of the desert and stretches to parts of Palmdale and Lancaster. The 2024 General election had Republican Assemblymember Thurston Smith against Republican Assemblymember Tom Lackey. Both incumbent legislators were in the same district and Lackey, who is from Palmdale, won the election. The official website for Lackey is https://ad34.asmrc.org/.

In my opinion, it would have made more sense for Forest Falls and Mountain Home Village to be in an Assembly district with the rest of the San Bernardino Mountain communities rather than in a district that is dominated by the Palm Springs region. There has been wide spread criticism of the commission for its lack of respect for including communities with common interest in the same districts. For instance, Redlands is cut up between two Congressional districts, two State Senate districts and three Assembly districts.

## Flatlanders and Highlanders


Here in our mountain communities, I see and hear a lot of talk about flatlanders. The term is not usually a complimentary one as it refers to others – outsiders – tourists. There are three major topics people discuss about flatlanders: traffic, trash, and trespassing.

If these people are the flatlanders because they come from "down the hill," then what does that make us—the people that live here now ... highlanders, mountaineers? The Spanish word for highlander is Serrano and that is the name given to the original people that lived here for over two thousand years. Before the roads (traffic), before modernization (trash), and even before the settlers (trespassing), there were people living here that had to contend with invaders much worse than a weekend tourist. Where our flatlanders drive

recklessly and endanger our people

– their flatlanders attacked and
displaced the people of this area.

Yuhaaviatam, is the traditional name for the original inhabitants of the area now called the San Bernardino mountains. Yuhaaviatam translates to the "People of the Pines." The "people, now known as the San Manuel Band of Mission Indians, are the Yuhaaviatam clan of Maara'yam (Serrano) and continue the tradition of holding sacred the land and everything it provides' (SanManuel-nsn.gov).

One important resource we can agree we need to hold sacred is the resource of each other. This last year was an exciting year for many local native people and the non-native people that celebrate native culture because this year saw the return of local powwows. For many of us, the return to each other through gathering was an important way of renewing our dedication to holding our land sacred by celebrating the people that live and flourish in this beautiful place.

Gathering together has returned to our communities here in the mountains. Garden Club, family game nights, art events, community potlucks, and movie nights – all of these things are our renewal – the way we can hold each other sacred, because we need each other. It is through each other that we are strong.

Yaamava' is the Serrano word for Spring, or rebirth, the mountain people are in a time of Spring – we who are healing from sickness, recovering from floods, and still remembering fires. After learning about the meaning of the word, I smile when I see Yaamava' – because it is a word of survival from a strong people that have survived and thrive. It is on the verge Spring, and it is an exciting time to practice renewal of self and community.

If you are interested to learn more about the local Serrano people and their history, I highly recommend a visit to the Malki Museum or checking out "The Serrano Indians of Southern California" by Francis J. Johnston.

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

#### **Have You Seen It?**

Have You Seen It? Everyone Should See This Movie. In my preparation for writing this, I did what I often do—I googled. If you google well, you will shift into areas of thinking you didn't consider when you started. After wading through the "best" and "favorite" thinking, I slid into movies

everyone should see. I didn't agree with all of the nominees, BUT Stephen Spielberg's most recent venture, **The Fabelmans**, most assuredly qualifies.

The film is a semi-autobiographical rendering of Spielberg's

adolescence and early adult life—how the process of filmmaking helped to create the man he is today. It is the end-result of his playing with all of the events of his life and shaping them into a story that the audience can empathize with.



His family is first and foremost at the crux. Both parents are supportive bringing him up in a good, strong environment with a good education and good, moral religious values—should have been a slam-dunk, but no. Something else is happening with his beloved parents and his discovery is near-devastating. Film is how he is able to persevere. Within his family structure, he has three sisters. They are another cornerstone to come to terms with reality. As often happens in families, the parents' situation and behavior draws siblings closer together for support and consolation.

Actively involved in a Boy Scout troop, Spielberg finds an endless supply of actors—some with questionable abilities. In one scene (which I believe was in the previews) Spielberg begins honing a director's skill of working one-on-one with his actors. He carefully describes in great detail the scene the older boy will play and how the events in the scene will affect him. The actor is unable to contain his own personal emotions as he walks through the set and keeps on walking to the dismay of the crew.

There is much light-hearted material to keep us laughing, but there is a counter balance that forces us the other way. One situation involves his subjection to bullying because of his ethnic and religious beliefs as a Jew. An opportunity for vengeance can't be contained by Spielberg's alter-ego actor which not only causes more retaliation from the athletes, but also the necessity to look at his own soul and his actions.

Spielberg's co-screenplay writer Tony Kushner explains the choice of Fabelman for the family name. "Spieler" in Yiddish/ German means actor. It's a short leap to "Fabel" which means fable in German. From my childhood, I remember my grandfather starting his little German polka band with "Eins, zwei, drei spielen," which translates to "One, two, three play." Since **The Fabelmans** has received an academy award nomination, it is still playing at many theaters in the Southland. You'll also be happy to know you can watch **The Fabelmans** from the comfort of your couch. Currently, you can rent The **Fabelmans** for \$19.99 or buy the film for \$24.99 from digital retailers **Amazon Prime, Apple TV, Vudu, and Google Play**.

## **Angeles or Angelus**

"Angeles" is Spanish for "angels" or "messengers of God." A name deeply connected to religion, Angeles is often chosen by parents who wish to honor Mary. Los Angeles, the largest city in the state and the second most populus city in the United States, got it's name from the Spanish Missionaries in the area, they called it, 'The Town of Our Lady, the Queen of the Angels'

Angelus, Latin for "angel" usually accompanied by the ringing of the Angelus bell, which is a call to prayer and to spread goodwill to everyone.

Angelus Oaks was initially called Camp Angelus. In 1849 there was a big gold strike in Holcomb Valley, north of Bear Valley and near the town that was later to become Big Bear. The only way to get supplies in and the gold out was by mule trains. The mule train traveled up the Santa Ana River Canyon, stopping overnight in Seven Oaks and then took a switch back trail (Clark's Grade; still visible on the mountain across from the Angelus Oaks Lodge) up to the gold fields. Eventually, a wagon road was built to replace the mule skinner trail. But, the Santa Ana River kept washing out the wagon road within the rugged canyon, and so another, better road, known as a 'Control Road', (because traffic was allowed to proceed one way in each direction only, with controls stationed at each end) was built in nearby Mill Creek Canyon. The "Lower Control Road" started at Mountain Home Village, in Mill Creek Canyon, and ended in Camp Angelus, at the Lodge. (The Lower Control Road later became known as Mountain Home Creek Road.) "Middle Control Road" started just east of the Lodge and meandered down to Seven Oaks. The final control road, 'Clark's Grade', went up and over the north side of the Santa Ana Canyon and into Bear Valley. The Clark Brothers, based at Clark's Ranch north and west of Seven Oaks, scratched out their control road by hand, and collected fees for its use.

In the 1970s, when the postal service decided to combine the two small post offices of Camp Angelus and Seven Oaks, closing the Seven Oaks location, they renamed the remaining office "Angelus Oaks". That name stuck with the town.


